Veterans Day is November 11th. The Seward Elementary School students always do a great program honoring our Veterans. If you get a chance, it is always inspiring to go watch the program and a great way to say thank you to our Veterans who have or are still serving in the military forces. Often, people confuse Memorial Day and Veterans Day. Memorial Day is a day for remembering and honoring military personnel who died in the service of their country. While those who died are also remembered, Veterans Day is the day set aside to thank and honor all those who served honorably in the military - in wartime or peacetime. In fact, Veterans Day is largely intended to thank living veterans for their service, to acknowledge that their contributions to our national security are appreciated, and to underscore the fact that all those who served - not only those who died - have sacrificed and done their duty.

November 11th is also known as Armistice Day. Armistice Day, later known as Veterans Day in the United States is celebrated every year on November 11 to mark the armistice signed between the Allies of World War I and Germany. The signing of the Armistice took place in Compiegne, France and called for the cessation of hostilities on the Western Front of World War I. The Armistice took effect at 11:00 AM- the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918. The armistice initially expired after 36 days and was extended several times. A formal peace agreement was reached when the Treaty of Versailles was signed in 1919. November is also recognized as Veterans and Military Family Month. Veterans and Military Families Month was established in 1996 by the Armed Services YMCA with the US Government recognizing the occasion every year since. Each November, the President signs a proclamation declaring November National Veterans and Military Families Month to recognize the daily sacrifices made by active duty, Guard and Reserve military families. It is important to remember that the families of Military personnel suffer many hardships and make many sacrifices in support of their military family member.

#### And of course, **Thanksgiving Day will be November 28th**. The Post will again do the traditional Thanksgiving dinner with all the trimmings. Volunteers are always needed and welcome to come assist with the preparation and delivery of meals to those in the community.

Hope everyone has a warm and safe November.

# Veterans Day

World War I - known at the time as "The Great War" officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars."

On November 11<sup>th</sup> at 11:11, 1921 the U.S., France and England each buried an unknown soldier in honor of those who died in World War I. This began the annual Armistice Day holiday. The time and day was picked because fighting ceased in WWI in 1918 on November 11<sup>th</sup> at 11:11. In keeping with the tradition, work stops on this day and time each year for a moment of silence. Please remember to recognize and thank our Veterans on this day.

Veterans Day, this year is officially on Monday November 11, 2024, Veterans Day honors all members of the Armed Forces who served this country. They served and fought to protect us, to keep our country safe, and to preserve our way of life. Veterans gave their time and risked their lives for us all. In some cases, they made the ultimate sacrifice.

This holiday was originally called Armistice Day and was first celebrated in 1921. In 1954, President Eisenhower changed it to Veterans Day, in honor of American Veterans who served in all wars. The holiday now is intended to thank veterans for their service and



to underscore that all those who served — both the living and the dead — have made sacrifices in performing their duty to the nation.

In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words: "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

An Act (52 Stat. 351; 5 U. S. Code, Sec. 87a) approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday—a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as "Armistice Day." Armistice Day was primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I, but in 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation's history; after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, the 83rd Congress, at the urging of the veterans service organizations, amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation (Public Law 380) on June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

Later that same year, on October 8th, President Dwight D. Eisenhower issued the first "Veterans Day Proclamation" which stated: "In order to insure proper and widespread observance of this anniversary, all veterans, all veterans' organizations, and the entire citizenry will wish to join hands in the common purpose. Toward this end, I am designating the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs as Chairman of a Veterans Day National Committee, which shall include such other persons as the Chairman may select, and which will coordinate at the national level necessary planning for the observance. I am also requesting the heads of all departments and agencies of the Executive branch of the Government to assist the National Committee in every way possible."

On that same day, President Eisenhower sent a letter to the Honorable Harvey V. Higley, Administrator of Veterans' Affairs (VA), designating him as Chairman of the Veterans Day National Committee. In 1958, the White House advised VA's General Counsel that the 1954 designation of the VA Administrator as Chairman of the Veterans Day National Committee applied to all subsequent VA Administrators.



Since March 1989 when the VA was elevated to a cabinet level department, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs has served as the committee's chairman.



The first Veterans Day under the new law was observed with much confusion on October 25, 1971. It was quite apparent that the commemoration of this day was a matter of historic and patriotic significance to a great number of our citizens, and so on September 20th, 1975, President Gerald R. Ford signed Public Law 94-97 (89 Stat. 479), which returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date of November 11, beginning in 1978. This action supported the desires of the overwhelming majority of state legislatures, all major veterans service organizations and the American people.

Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of the week on which it falls. The restoration of the observance of Veterans Day to November 11 not only preserves the historical significance of the date, but helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: A celebration to honor America's veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.

## **Veterans Day Traditions**

In the United States, an official <u>wreath-laying ceremony</u> is held each Veterans Day at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery, while parades and other celebrations are held in states around the country.

Veterans Day is <u>not to be confused with Memorial Day</u>—a common misunderstanding, according to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Memorial Day (the fourth Monday in May) honors American service members who died in service to their country or as a result of injuries incurred during battle; while Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans—living or dead—but especially gives thanks to living veterans who served their country honorably during war or peacetime.

Our monthly meeting is held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Thursday of the month and all Squadron 5 members are invited to attend.


