If you run into any problems, don't hesitate to let Adjutant Jeff Ludwig or myself know. We will step you through the process.




Adjutants Corner

Sawadee Fellow Veterans;

When a veteran sends the Veterans Administration a claim for disability or benefits, the process is usually a routine procedure. An "Intent to File" form is the first form to submit, to notify the VA a new disability claim is forthcoming.

The second process is to file the actual Disability Claim form, which is more in depth and details information concerning the nature of the disability the veteran wishes to claim.

The Post Service Officer can provide assistance and advice to veterans before they send the VA their claim forms. If a veteran is unable to complete the claim forms due to being handicapped or is incapable of completing the form on their own, the Post Service can transcribe the claim form for the veteran.

It is when the widow of a deceased veteran must file a claim form for compensation or benefits, that the process becomes more difficult and complicated, especially when a veteran has a Thai spouse who has limited or no English language skills.

The Post Service Officer (PSO) can assist and provide guidance to Thai spouses in the claims process. The Thai spouse does have the responsibility to provide the PSO with all the necessary documents, in order to provide the VA critical information to process claims.

Therefore, it is incumbent upon the veteran to ensure their spouse can readily access all the important documents the veteran has concerning their military service, and their medical documentation as well. The veteran should also maintain documents the VA has provided to the veteran, that pertains to any prior disability ratings the VA has awarded the veteran.

The PSO then develops a claims package. All required documents will then be submitted to an Accredited Service Officer, who submits the documents directly to the Veterans Administration. This can be a lengthy process and may take up to a year before a spouse may be awarded financial compensation or benefits.

Veterans should maintain all their military and medical documents. Please keep these documents in a safe and secure place where your spouse can easily access the records. I am seeing an increase in the number of cases where a veteran suddenly passes away, and his spouse can not locate her husband's vital records. The most important form a spouse needs to have access to quickly is the veteran's DD Form 214.

Safety Message: Emergency numbers in Thailand.

So, you are living in Thailand or you are visiting Thailand. What will you do if you have an emergency; who will you call? In the USA it is simple, you would simply call 911. But who do you call here in Thailand? In Thailand there is no one-number to call. It depends on the type of emergency. Being in the middle of an emergency is not the time to find out. The table below gives a list of numbers you need to have handy in case of an emergency. I recommend you keep this handy and have the numbers loaded in your cell phone. I have a copy on the wall in my house as well as loaded in my phone.



National Preparedness Month

National Preparedness Month (NPM), is recognized each September to promote family and community disaster and emergency planning now and throughout the year.

Our Post membership is scattered throughout Thailand and the USA. That being said, our members are exposed to just



about a every natural disaster including hurricanes, typhoons, tornadoes, monsoon floods, strong winds, and earthquakes to name the most common natural disasters.

Get Prepared

Emergency Plan: The <u>Federal Emergency Management Agency</u> (FEMA) encourages you to plan ahead for a disaster. You can do this by establishing a meeting place and evacuation route with your family. According to FEMA, the family meeting place should be familiar and easy to find. The FEMA website lists helpful tips on how to start an emergency plan at – (<u>https://www.ready.gov/plan</u>). You can download and fill out emergency plans for families, pets, property, and more at this website.

Disaster Preparedness Kit: Everyone should have a disaster preparedness kit ready should a disaster strike. Each member's disaster preparedness kit will be based on the threats in their area.

• Keep key important documents and medical information safe and easy to find. Before a disaster, <u>safeguard critical documents</u>. This includes medical records, prescription information, and your uniformed services ID card. It's also a good idea to make a list of illnesses, allergies, and prescription bottles for all family members.

Being prepared for events like wildfires, floods, and hurricanes can help keep you and your family safe. You can't predict what and when a disaster will occur but you can predict what you should do before, during, and after an emergency.

Speaking of history in Thailand, Comrade David Burns provide a bit of history on his unit, 16th Special Operations Squadron (**Spectre**). David served 4 tours with the unit at Ubon Thailand. The AC-130 gunships, equipped with side firing, trainable 25 mm, 40 mm, and 105 mm guns, had a storied history during the Vietnam Conflict. The Gunships destroyed more than 10,000 trucks and were credited with many life-saving close air support missions. It is fitting the song <u>Ghost</u> <u>Riders in the Sky</u> was the theme song for the "Spectre" gunships in Thailand during the Vietnam war. The song still has special meaning to many who served.



Some History of the 16th. SOS at Ubon Thailand

The 16th SOS was activated at Ubon RTAFB on 31 October 1968 and began flying combat missions on what was called the Ho Chi Minh Trail, (which in actuality was almost all of South East Asia. Laos, Cambodia, North and South Vietnam. There were a total of six aircraft losses during the war.

The first loss was aircraft number 629 on 24 May 1969. The Aircraft was hit by 37MM antiaircraft fire over the Trail killing the illuminator. The aircraft lost most of its control capability. The Aircraft commander managed to get it back to Thai Air Space where he directed most of his crew to bail out. The remaining four crew members tried to bring the aircraft back to Ubon. When the aircraft landed it went out of control and crashed and burned on the runway killing the flight engineer.

Second loss was aircraft 625 hit by 37MM anti-aircraft fire over the A Shau Valley, South Vietnam on 22 April, 1970. Out of a crew of 11, only one managed to bail out. Ten were killed in action (KIA).

Third loss, Aircraft 044 hit by a SAM-2 Missile on 29 March 1972 over the Trail. There were no survivors, 14 crew were KIA.

Fourth Loss Aircraft 571 hit by 57MM anti-aircraft fire on 30 March, 1972, again over the Trail. This time all 15 crew members bailed out and were rescued. It was called, "the great easter egg hunt" as so many men were down in Laos at one time!

Fifth loss, Aircraft 043 hit by SAM-7 missile on 18 June, 1972 over the Trail, out of a crew of 12, no survivors.

Sixth loss, Aircraft 490 hit by 57MM anti-aircraft fire on 21 December 1972 over the Trail. Out of a crew of a crew of 17 only three survived.

Remember to vote in the primaries!







Absentee ballots will be on their way in less than a month, but it's not too late for voters to register and request theirs.

Remind voters that the deadline to get registered and request a ballot for November 3 using the Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) depends on their state of residency. Here are a few resources to share with voters to assist them with requesting their ballot:

- Check their state's specific deadlines.
- Add election dates and reminders to their calendars.
- Offer to speak with voters to discuss any questions or concerns directly.
- <u>Download</u> and share the map below to see if their state allows them to send in their FPCA electronically to avoid mail delays.

How to Vote Absentee from Abroad

As a U.S. citizen living outside the country, you can vote absentee while living away from your voting residence.

Here's how:

1. Register to vote and request your ballot in one easy step.

Fill out the Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) and send it to your election office.

Check your voter registration deadline for the next election based on your state. For the General Election, it's best to send in the FPCA by August 1.

Your voting residence (the U.S. state or territory where you are registering to vote) is likely your legal residence. Here's how to determine your voting residence.

Using the FPCA ensures that your state will send your ballot to you at least 45 days before the election — a protection not guaranteed when using other forms. It's a good idea to send in a new FPCA every January and each time you move.
