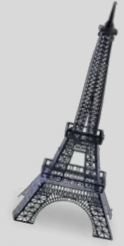

Certification of Officers: Thank you to the Posts who have recently held elections and sent in the Notification forms. I can add all Post Officers to the Post Officers Roster on myLegion.org. Reminder, after Post elections or a change in Post Officers, it is required to send two forms to the Department Adjutant.

1. Notification of Post/Squadron Commanders & Adjutants: This

form must be sent to the Department Adjutant immediately (within 24 hours) after Post elections. The form should be dated the date of the elections / appointment.

2. Post Officer Certification of Service Form: This form has been revised and sent to all Posts. It needs to be forwarded to the Department Adjutant as soon as possible after Post elections (within 15 days). The Effective Date of Election of Appointment is the date of the original election or appointment. For example, if an Officer was elected on 1 May 2023 and reelected on 1 May 2024, the Effective Date block will show 1 May 2023.

These forms are critical to keep the current Post Officer informed of Department news. If I do not have the correct information, your Post may not receive vital information.

Please contact me for any questions or if you need the forms.

Dear Comrades,

The Department of France membership is unique in that most of us live in a foreign country, and yet we retain our American citizenship, and our ability to participate in the American political process by voting in our elections back home.

Whether you are active-duty military, federal civilian workforce, or if you are living overseas on a host country visa, you are still eligible to vote in the elections in your last U.S. home of record. Further, in some states, U.S. citizens who were born abroad — and have never resided in the United States — are also eligible to vote absentee.

The Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA) extends federal absentee voting rights to Service members, their eligible family members, and overseas citizens. UOCAVA covers U.S. citizens who are

18 or older AND active-duty members of the Uniformed Services, Merchant Marine, or commissioned corps of the Public Health Service and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration; their eligible family members; and U.S. citizens residing outside the United States.

UOCAVA citizens can use the Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) to register to vote and request an absentee ballot simultaneously. They can also use the FPCA to update their contact information. The FWAB is an emergency backup ballot for UOCAVA citizens who did not receive an absentee ballot from their state in time to participate in the election.

Most states and territories require you to register to vote. Fill out an FPCA to register and request an absentee ballot at the same time. You should send in a new FPCA every January and each time you move. It is recommended that you send in an FPCA at least 90 days before the election in which you want to vote, but even as deadlines approach, we always encourage you to submit as state laws vary and you may qualify for a ballot containing only federal offices. The FPCA allows you to request an absentee ballot for all federal elections in the calendar year. Depending on your state, you may receive a ballot with local or state offices and initiatives as well (e.g., Governor, City Council). It is recommended that you send in a

new FPCA every January and each time you move.

Elections are run at the state level. You must communicate directly with your state to register, request a ballot, and vote. Most embassies and consulates will help you to fill out the FPCA and FWAB, but they are not polling places. Ultimately, you must be pro-active in voting, because your vote counts.

Refer to your embassy/consulate website for information on returning your voted ballots postage-free through the diplomatic mail. Each embassy/consulate will vary on dedicated hours and procedures for dropping off ballots for postage free return to the United States, so it best to call or check their website first.

Here is the latest Department of State message on voting from Germany!

Event: Voting in 2024 U.S. Elections

Your vote counts! Did you know that many U.S. federal elections for the House of Representatives and Senate have been decided by a margin smaller than the number of ballots cast by absentee voters? All states are required to count every absentee ballot that is valid and reaches local election officials by the absentee ballot receipt deadline.

Follow a few simple steps to make sure that you can vote in the 2024 federal U.S. elections:

1. Request your ballot. Complete a new Federal Post Card Application (FPCA). You must complete a new FPCA after January 1, 2024, to ensure you receive your ballot for the 2024 elections. Submitting the FPCA allows you to request absentee ballots for all elections for federal offices (President, U.S. Senate, and U.S. House of Representatives) including primaries and special elections during the calendar year in which it is submitted. All local election officials in all U.S. states and territories accept the FPCA.

You can complete the FPCA online at [FVAP.gov](https://fvap.gov). The online voting assistant will ask you questions specific to your state. We encourage you to request your blank ballots be delivered electronically (by email, internet download, or fax, depending on your state). Include your email address on your FPCA to take advantage of the electronic ballot delivery option. Return the FPCA per the instructions on the website. The online voting assistant will tell you if your state allows the FPCA to be returned electronically or if you must submit a paper copy with original ink signature. If you must return a paper version, please follow the same instructions below for returning your ballot.

2. Receive and complete your ballot. States are required to send out ballots 45 days before a regular election for federal office and generally send ballots at least 30 days before primary elections. For most states, you can confirm your registration and ballot delivery online.

3. Return your completed ballot. While some states allow you to return your completed ballot electronically, others do not. If your state requires you to return paper voting forms or ballots to local election officials, you can do so free of charge at U.S. Embassy Berlin, U.S. Consulate General Frankfurt, or U.S. Consulate General Munich. Place your ballot in a postage-paid return envelope or in an envelope bearing sufficient domestic U.S. postage and address them to the relevant local election officials. You can also return

your FPCA or ballot to your local election officials via international mail or professional courier service at your own expense.

**Ballot Dropoff Instructions:
Embassy Berlin:**

U.S. Citizens wishing to drop off ballots can do so at the Hüttenweg entrance (Clayallee 170, 14195 Berlin) of the U.S. Embassy building located in Dahlem between the hours of 1300-1500, Monday through Friday (except U.S. and German holidays). Please bring a form of identification (preferably a U.S. passport) and inform the guard that you would like to drop off voting materials. Ballots will not be accepted at the Embassy building in Mitte near the Brandenburg Gate.

Consulate General Frankfurt:

U.S. citizens wishing to drop off ballots can do so at the Consular entrance (Gießener Str. 30, 60435 Frankfurt) of the Consulate General between the hours of 0700-1600, Monday through Friday (except U.S. and German holidays). Please bring a form of identification (preferably a U.S. passport) and inform the guard that you would like to drop off voting materials. The guard will show you to the voting materials drop-box where you can leave your registration or ballot.

Consulate General Munich:

U.S. citizens wishing to drop off ballots can do so at the Consular entrance (Von-der-Tann Straße) of the Consulate General (Koeniginstraße 5 München 80539) between the hours of 1300-1500, Monday through Friday (except U.S. and German holidays). Please bring a form of identification (preferably a U.S. passport) and inform the guard that you would like to drop off voting materials. The guard will show you to the voting materials drop-box where you can leave your registration or ballot.

Please note that all visitors to the Embassy or Consulates are subject to security screening and you will not be permitted to bring electronic devices, including cell phones, inside the facility. Also note that it can take up to four weeks for mail to reach its destination if sent by an embassy or consulate via diplomatic pouch. All U.S. citizens are advised to submit their forms and ballots accordingly.

Any U.S. citizen voter in Germany, regardless of location, may elect to submit their ballot by mail within Germany to U.S. Embassy Berlin. U.S. citizens wishing to drop off ballots in-person at one of the U.S. Consulates General in Düsseldorf, Hamburg, or Leipzig can email GermanyACS@state.gov to coordinate a time to do so.

Submission by Mail:

U.S. citizens throughout Germany may mail their documents to the U.S. Embassy in Berlin using any local courier. Simply place your sealed envelope containing your ballot inside a local mailing envelope addressed to: U.S. Consulate Berlin
ATTN: DPO/Election Material
Clayallee 170
14195 Berlin

Upon receipt, the embassy will forward the inner envelope to the United States using the diplomatic pouch. **IMPORTANT:** You must include your home address in Germany as the return address on both envelopes. Any envelope received without a return address cannot be forwarded through the diplomatic pouch and will be discarded.

I have voted from overseas, in both my capacities as US Military, and as an Expatriate, in about 18 elections over the years, as best I can recall, and have never had an issue. To this point, be

Special Announcement: "On 4 July we will honor the life of Commandant George Aubrey."

Merci beaucoup to the Vichy Chapter of the Association France Etats-Unis for their upcoming ceremony in honor of George Aubrey!

Please join the Vichy Chapter of the Association France Etats-Unis in Creuzier-le-Vieux on the 4th of July for

an Independence Day ceremony, and also a special event and ceremony in honor of George Aubrey.

George Aubrey was born in Northampton, Massachusetts in 1893. He entered the United States Army as a captain and served as company commander during WWI, eventually being promoted to the rank of major. He sustained multiple injuries in September 1918 at the Battle of Saint-Mihiel, and was discharged soon after. Following his military service, he married Frenchwoman Alberte Viette in 1919 before moving to the United States to study engineering. Two years later in 1921, he returned to France. He had two sons, Norbert and Guy. Aubrey was an active member of Paris Post 1 of the newly founded American Legion.

When France fell in 1940, Aubrey was one of only 500 Americans left in Paris, and he was forced to flee less than a year later. From his new location south of Paris near Saint Amand-Montrond, he continued his efforts by remaining in contact with the Allied forces, organizing a group of maquis fighters (his code name was LAFAYETTE), and assisting the Free French in North Africa until his death in July 1944. Aubrey was killed in the commune of Bétête when driving home from a meeting with other French Resistance leaders. After coming across a German unit, Aubrey and passengers in his car opened fire but were easily overtaken by the Germans. Aubrey was shot multiple times by machine gun fire, however, he managed to hide secret documents detailing Resistance plans before he was killed.

George Aubrey was buried in a nearby family vault but was moved to a cemetery in Creuzier-le-Vieux on May 5, 1948 for permanent, proper burial. Aubrey was posthumously awarded the French Croix de la Légion d'Honneur.

Filming was important not only for Paris Post 1's documentary, but to also capture historic moments during the 80th Anniversary of D-Day.

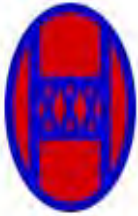

Attendees,

I had the opportunity to lead the United States Congress in a commemoration of Maureen Sweeney's life in 2021. I was honored to play a small part in recognizing her service. Maureen's skill and poise as the weather forecaster at Ireland's County Mayo weather station during World War II saved countless Allied lives and ensured the success of the D-Day Invasion.

I know everyone in attendance today is surely aware of Maureen Sweeney's impact and how it reverberates today. On June 3, 1944 – her 21st birthday – Maureen compiled a report warning of stormy weather hitting the English Channel the morning of June 5. Unknown to her at the time, this was the initial date chosen by Allied command for the invasion of Normandy – an operation which required clear skies for air support and calm water to ensure the safety of those in amphibious landing craft. Maureen's weather report was passed along to General Dwight D. Eisenhower, who made the fateful decision to delay the landings by 24 hours. A subsequent weather report predicted clear conditions the morning of June 6. Despite the ongoing rain and wind, General Eisenhower put his trust in the forecasters like Maureen and went forward with the invasion. As we know, the successful landings set the stage for Allied victory in Europe less than a year later. General Eisenhower would later comment, "I thank the Gods of War we went when we did."

On this 80th Anniversary of the D-Day landing, I am honored to again recognize the service of Maureen Flavin Sweeney on behalf of the United States Congress. Her skill and professionalism were crucial in ensuring Allied victory, and her legacy will live on for generations to come.

Major events in Erris village to mark D-Day anniversary

The Erris village of Blacksod is gearing up to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings with a series of events on Thursday, June 6th. This events will mark the crucial role played by Blacksod Lighthouse in the success of the Normandy invasion, a turning point in World War II.

On June 6th, 1944, Allied Forces landed on the beaches of Normandy, initiating the liberation of France from Nazi occupation. However, this vital operation was originally scheduled for June 5th but was postponed due to a critical weather report from Blacksod Lighthouse. The report, made by then 21-year-old Maureen Sweeney, predicted bad weather, leading to the rescheduling of the landings. Historians assert that this weather forecast significantly contributed to the success of the operation, as adverse conditions on the original date could have spelled disaster for the Allied troops.

The local community, led by Fergus Sweeney, a grandson of Maureen, of the Solas Visitor Experience and Tourism Hub, has organised a day-long programme to honour this significant contribution.

The day will begin with a Dawn Remembrance Ceremony at 5am at Blacksod Lighthouse. Exhibits will be open to the public, showcasing the roles of Met Éireann, An Post, and the Defence Forces during the war. These exhibits, enhanced with materials related to the D-Day weather forecast, will offer insights into Maureen Sweeney's life and Blacksod's key role. Highlights include displays from Met Éireann, An Post, Military Archives, Irish Lights, and movie props from Steven Spielberg's blockbuster, *Saving Private Ryan*.

Guest speakers, including US Army veteran Ron Howko and retired Irish Army officer Donal Buckley, will provide engaging talks on topics such as 'US Forces on D-Day' and 'Irish Neutrality, Then and Now.' Musical entertainment by Bridget McMahon and an aircraft flyover (weather permitting) dedicated to the men of the Lookout Posts will add to the day's commemorative atmosphere.

The day's events will conclude with a panel discussion chaired by Michael Kennedy, author of 'Guarding Neutral Ireland,' commencing at 5pm.

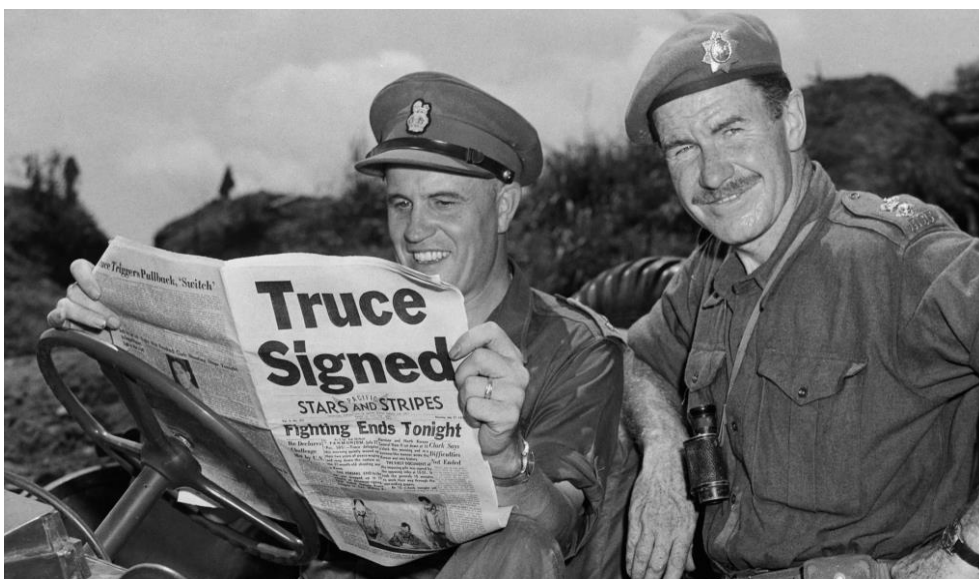

On 4 June 2024 my wife and I began our quest to attend as many Memorial Services as possible at the 80th Anniversary of the D-Day Invasion to Liberate France and destroy the German Military Machine. I will give you some pictures of our most humble adventure as we moved through the multitude of visitors to the sites of the fallen. Our first Memorial was with the 1st Infantry Division, 4 June 24 which

landed on Omaha Beach in the vicinity of Colleville Sur Mer, France. The Division encountered sever losses as they pushed on to the beach and up a slight hill encountering heavy fire from the German Forces. The Monument is a tall grey granite obelisk commemorating by name all of the First Infantry Division soldiers killed while fighting in the area. This memorial, overlooking the Easy Red sector of "Bloody Omaha" beach commemorates the

Big Red One's 627 dead between 6 June and 24 July 1944. There are three names engraved in Gold as they are Medal of Honor Recipients.





5th Battalion Rangers Monument Plaque

The 5th Battalion Rangers broke across the seawall and barbed wire entanglements, and up the pillbox-rimmed heights under intense enemy machine gun and mortar fire and with A, B and C Companies of the 2nd Ranger Battalion and elements of the 116th Infantry Regiment, advanced four miles (6 km) to the key town of Vierville-sur-Mer, thus opening the breach for supporting troops to follow up and expand the beachhead. We visited this Plaque on 5 June 24 while visiting the National Guard (Guard Monument).



5th Engineer Special Brigade Monument

The next monument was the 5th Engineer Brigade 4 June 24. For the invasion of Normandy, the brigade had a strength of 6,756 men. It landed on Omaha Beach, where it was responsible for the eastern beaches, Easy Red, Fox Green and Fox Red. The brigade operated Omaha Beach until it was closed on 19 November 1944.



Guard Monument

We visited the Guard Monument and memorial dedicated to the 29th Infantry Division, National Guard, on 5 June 24. Known as the Blue

and Gray Division, the 29th Infantry Division is an Army National Guard operational-level headquarters located at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. The 29th Division joined with the 1st Division to assault Omaha Beach on D-Day, June 6, 1944. The 116th Infantry landed in the first wave at 0630 hours on the western half of the beach and met unexpectedly fierce resistance from German troops entrenched on the coastal bluffs. Despite heavy losses, the 116th penetrated the enemy defenses and established a tenuous beachhead by nightfall. The 115th Infantry landed at about 11 AM, and the 175th the next morning.





Overall, this was a great trip even though I could not attend the actual 6 June ceremonies. The streets were blocked off and you could only enter with a specific pass. The ceremonies were relegated to invited guests only. They were expecting 35 Heads of State which included the United States President.
