Commitment from Veterans United Home Loans, announced May 27, prior to the Indy 500, to support The American Legion and the Legion-sponsored 48 car of Chip Ganassi Racing in a collaboration to raise awareness and develop programs to prevent veteran suicide.

\$357,228

Amount in American Legion Legacy Scholarship funds awarded in May to 32 recipients, children of military men and women who either lost their lives or became 50% or more disabled while on active duty since 9/11.

Amount raised by mid-May for the Legacy Scholarship Fund by West Virginia American Legion Riders through its first department Legacy Run, which also included participants from Ohio, Maryland and Virginia. The run was covered by Fox News.

"Behind lies an old world torn apart through centuries of discord; countries marked by an eternal struggle of people against ambitious dictators; nations where hopes are born and die with people starving and hope gone.
