Sawadee Fellow Veterans;

I have written before about the PACT ACT and the "Presumptive Conditions" that many fellow veterans are now experiencing. However, all veterans need to be aware that their current medical problems, may be a result of their exposure to Agent Orange in both Vietnam and Thailand.

The Veterans Administration (VA) informs veterans that Agent Orange (AO) defoliant use was discontinued in both Vietnam and Thailand in the early 70's. However, the VA does not inform veterans that the very toxic chemical "Dioxin" in Agent Orange, can remain at 50% active for about 9 to 15 years, even after defoliation operations stopped.

Many Vietnam or Thailand veterans who now experience medical problems, may have current or chronic illnesses that could be attributed to their Agent Orange exposure many, many years ago, while serving in Southeast Asia. Medical conditions such as hypertension, diabetes, various types of cancer, and other medical issues, may be a result of Agent Orange exposure and not just because a veteran's health is declining due to old age or lifestyle.

As Post Service Officer, I can provide advice or assistance in helping veterans achieve the highest disability rating possible, especially if you believe you have a service-connected medical issue, or you have a medical condition you believe could be a PACT ACT Presumptive Condition.

On Thursday, June 27 we had the pleasure of meeting with Ambassador Godec. He came over with his American Citizens Services Outreach team to meet American Citizens in the Ubon, Isan area. Ambassador Godec first talked about the state of relations with Thailand and American citizens living in Thailand. He talked about the American Embassy in Bangkok and its various roles and programs. He stated that the Embassy in Thailand is the largest US Embassy in the world. He went on to list some of the programs that are operated out of the Embassy including areas of education, business, and health research studies.



After his presentation he opened the floor to questions for him. One of the first



topics to come up was the taxation of foreign income. Thai Taxation Treaty would require negotiations from both parties. He pledged to do his best to look at the interest of Americans. Ambassador Godec thanked Embassy volunteers John Skabry and Wayne Wright for the

great work they are doing in the ISAN area supporting the Embassy.

We pledged the support of our American Legion Post TH01 in helping not only veterans in the Isan area but any Americans in need. We urged the Ambassador and his staff look towards us for assistance when an American is need of assistance and it is outside the boundary of the Embassy and the State Department. We pledge to do our best to help fellow veterans and American citizens here in Thailand.

Safety Message: July

Today I was watching the 80th. Anniversary of the Normandy Invasion. I wish I would have seen it before I wrote my history article for June's newsletter.



It was a humbling experience to watch. The ceremony was held at Omaha beach in Normandy. There were speeches given by President Biden, French President Macron, King Charles, England Prime Minister Sunak and many more. Someone spoke before President Biden, but I didn't get his name, gave a speech about how when America goes to war, when it's over we go home. We don't stay and take the country over. He also mentioned how America and its allies stood up to Hitler. Everyone knew what the

casualties could be but they did their job knowing the chances were they would be killed. 73,000 US members participated in the invasion. 2,501 paid with their life. Over 5,000 were wounded. Today there is less than 1% remaining alive; 131 die each day.

There were 150 US Veterans in attendance. 24 were veterans of the landing. The oldest being 102. I watched as President Macron gave the Legion of Honor to 11 US Veterans each one individually





followed by President

Biden having a short discussion with each of them and giving a presidential coin. Many were in wheelchairs but when it came for them to receive their medal many struggled to stand and did their best to stand straight at attention. After 80 years they still struggled to talk about what they experienced. President Biden recognized 6 of the veterans and told what they did at Normandy. They were the "Greatest Generation" and if you were able to have a discussion with one who would open up about his experience, you were lucky. Walter Stitt

who fought in tanks and will turn 100 in July said, "There are things worth fighting for, although I wish there was another way to do it than to try to kill each other." Well said.

At the closing, there was a 21-gun salute along with 21 canons each firing a round. Sonnerie aux morts and Taps were played. A missing man fly-bye was flown by F-35s.

Sadly, next year there will be less veterans. As time passes by, we tend to forget the different battles Americans fought. You don't see much about the Revolutionary War, The Civil War, Spanish American War and many more. WWII eliminated Hitler who was the cause of so many deaths and destruction. Let us hope this is taught in our schools for a long, long time. They aren't called the "Greatest Generation" for nothing. They went and did their job and came home and most never talked about what they did.
