## August 7, 2024 - Purple Heart Day

Also, another important day in the history of the U.S is <u>VJ Day</u> (Victory over Japan Day). Exactly what day it is celebrated is a little confusing:



August 14th - Japan surrendered

August 15<sup>th</sup> - the surrender is announced to the world. The day that is most commonly recognized and celebrated in modern days.

September 2 - the formal surrender ceremony was held in Tokyo Bay aboard the USS Missouri and formal signing of the surrender occurred. At that time President Truman declared September 2nd to be VJ Day.

VJ Day marks the end of WWII and the end of fighting against Japan. It is called Victory in Japan Day or Victory over Japan Day. Regardless of what day it is celebrated it marked the end of WWII and the fighting between the US and Japan.

It is important to remembers these days in history and remember the men and women who served during this time. Many of them making the ultimate sacrifice for their country.

## August 4, 2024 US Coast Guard Birthday

Each August 4, the U.S. <u>Coast Guard</u> celebrates its birthday.

The Coast Guard is one of America's six armed forces and traces its founding to Aug. 4, 1790. That's when the first Congress authorized construction of 10 vessels to enforce tariff and trade laws, prevent smuggling, and protect the collection of federal revenue. Responsibilities added over the years include humanitarian duties such as aiding mariners in distress.

The service received its current name in 1915 when the Revenue Cutter Service merged with the U.S. Life-Saving Service to form a single maritime service dedicated to the safety of life at sea and enforcing the nation's maritime laws



The Coast Guard is a multi-mission maritime military service. Its mission is to protect the public, the environment and U.S. economic interests in the nation's waterways, along the coast, on international waters or in any maritime region as required to support national security.

While other branches of the Armed Forces have a good time joking about whether their "Coastie" brethren are actually a branch of the military (they are), the Coast Guard continues to quietly straddle the dual mission of serving as a military force abroad and a law enforcement agency at home.

For more than 230 years, the first line of American coastal defense has been the United States <u>Coast Guard</u> in some way, shape or form. Whether protecting the nation's waterways, rescuing sailors at sea or enforcing maritime law, the Coast Guard was there.

With all the Coast Guard does to serve this nation, help us celebrate this service's **234th birthday** on Aug. 4, 2024. And thank a "Coastie" for their service in both peace and war.




